

Administration Guidelines for the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Assessment 1st Grade Form A

Purpose:

The purpose of this assessment is to gather information about a student and monitor progress with the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness lessons. This is not a normed assessment, so teachers may use examples when introducing each skill. Options for correct and incorrect responses are provided for teacher administration.

This assessment can be used to gather baseline data about a whole class prior to implementing the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness curriculum as part of daily literacy instruction.

This assessment is not required to use the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness curriculum.

Assessment Materials:

The materials required for this assessment include:

- One copy of the assessment for each student
- Pencil

Administering the Assessment:

- The assessment is administered individually to students.
- Phonemic awareness is oral and auditory, so the assessment administrator will record all responses. There is no student copy provided for the student, and the students do not read or write words during the assessment.
- Mark a correct response with a plus sign (+) in the Student Response column.
- Mark an incorrect response with a dash (-) and record the incorrect response.

There is a place to record student errors, as this can inform instruction.

Discontinue: You may discontinue the skill if there are no correct responses within the first 3 words.

Response Time: If a student is unable to give a response within 4 seconds, the administrator can move onto the next assessment word. Indicate this in the Observation checklist for each skill.

Visual Support and Hand Motions: We do not require hand motions to be used during this assessment administration. However, if the administrator finds that visuals such as counters or chips, or tapping/chopping sounds would be helpful, he/she may decide to use these as a support. This would be noted on the Scoring Guidelines page at the end, or it can be noted for each skill.

Observations: There is a place to record student observations for each skill, and overall with the scoring guidelines. These observations can be used to inform instruction during whole group lessons or for intervention.

Form A: Phonemic Awareness Assessment for 1st Grade

Onset Fluency: Initial phoneme isolation

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word and isolate the first sound in the word. The word is *house*. The first sound we hear in the word *house* is /h/. Can you repeat this back to me: house, /h/? Now it's your turn. What is the first sound you hear in the word *bird*?

Correct response	Yes, /b/ is the first sound we hear in the word <i>bird</i> .
Incorrect response	Listen, /b/, <i>bird</i> . /b/ is the first sound we hear in the word <i>bird</i> .

Teacher: I will say a word and you will repeat it. What is the first sound you hear in the word ____?

Blending Phonemes into Spoken Words:

RF.1.2.B

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say the sounds in a word and blend those sounds together to say the whole word. Listen. /h/-/ŭ/-/g/, *hug*. When I blend those 3 sounds together, /h/-/ŭ/-/g/, the word is *hug*. Now it's your turn. Listen to these sounds and tell me the whole word: /t/-/ā/-/k/. What is the word?

Correct response	Yes, when you blend the sounds, /t/ - /ā/ - /k/, the word is <i>take</i> .
Incorrect response	Listen, when I blend the 3 sounds, /t/ - /ā/ - /k/, the word is <i>take</i> . Can you say it back to me? /t/ - /ā/ - /k/, <i>take</i> .

Teacher: I will say three (or four) sounds. What is the whole word?

Note: Students can repeat the sounds before blending them into a word.

Final Phoneme Isolation

RF.1.2.C

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word and isolate the last sound in the word. The word is *bake*. The last sound I hear in the word *bake* is /k/. Can you say that back to me: *bake*, /k/? Now it's your turn. I will say a word and you say it back to me: *vote*. What is the last sound you hear in the word *vote*?

Correct response	Yes, /t/ is the last sound you hear in the word <i>vote</i> .
Incorrect response	Listen, <i>vote</i> ; /t/ is the last sound we hear in the word <i>vote</i> . Can you say it back to me: <i>vote</i> , /t/

Teacher: I will say a word. You will tell me the last sound you hear in the word.

Segmenting words into Phonemes

RF.1.2. D

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word and I will segment the word into sounds. Listen. *lock*, /l/ - /ɔ/ - /k/. I hear 3 sounds in *lock*, /l/ - /ɔ/ - /k/. Now it's your turn. I will say a word and you will say it back to me. The word is *beak*. What are the sounds you hear in the word *beak*?

Correct response	Yes, when you segment the word <i>beak</i> into sounds, you hear /b/ - /ē/ - /k/.
Incorrect response	When I segment the word <i>beak</i> into sounds, I hear 3 sounds /b/ - /ē/ - /k/. Say it back to me: <i>beak</i> , /b/ - /ē/ - /k/.

Teacher: I will say a word. What are the sounds you hear in the word ___?

Isolating the medial (vowel) sound in spoken words

RF.1.2.C

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word and I will isolate the middle or vowel sound in that word. The word is *much*. The middle or vowel sound I hear in the word *much* is /*ū*/. Can you say that: much, /*ū*/? Now it's your turn. I will say a word and you will say it back to me: *sick*. What is the middle or vowel sound you hear in the word *sick*?

Correct response	Yes, the sound we hear in the middle of the word <i>sick</i> is / <i>ī</i> /.		
Incorrect response	Listen, <i>sick</i> , / <i>ī</i> /. / <i>ī</i> / is the sound we hear in the middle of the word <i>sick</i> .		
Teacher: I will say a word. You will tell me the sound you hear in the middle of the word.

Adding Initial Phonemes

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word part. I will add a sound at the beginning to make a new word. Listen, /-at/. When I add /h/ at the beginning, the word is /h/-/at/, hat. Now it's your turn. Say /-ook/. Add /b/ at the beginning and the word is?

Correct response	Yes, when you add /b/ to /ook/, the word is <i>book</i> .			
Incorrect response	When I add /b/ to /-ook/, the word is /b/-/ook/, book. Can you say it back to me? /b/- /ook/, book.			
Teacher: I will say a word part (rime) and you will say it back to me. Then I will tell you a sound to add at the beginning and you will tell me the new word.				
Example: T: Say, -and. S: -and T: Add /s/ at the beginning and the word is? Student Response: sand

Deleting Initial Phonemes

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word. I will take away the first sound and tell you what is left. The word is *man*. Without /m/, what's left is /-an/. Now it's your turn. Say, *sock*. Without /s/, what's left is?

Correct response	Yes, sock without /s/ is /-ock/.
Incorrect response	Say, sock. /s/ is the first sound we hear in sock. When we take /s/ away, what's left is /-ock/. Can you say /-ock/?

Teacher: I will say a word. You will say the word back to me. I will tell you the sound to take away or delete, and you will tell me what is left.

Example: T: cup S: cup T: without /k, what's left is? Student Response: /-up/

Substituting Initial Phonemes

Teacher Administration Directions: I will say a word. I will change the first sound to make a new word. The word is *my*. Change /m/ to /b/ and the word is *by*.

Now it's your turn. Say *dot*. Change /d/ to /h/ and the word is?

Correct response	Yes, when you change /d/ to /h/, the word is hot.
Incorrect response	Say, dot. /d/ is the first sound we hear in dot. When I change /d/ to /h/, the new word is /h/ - /ot/, hot. Can you say hot?

Teacher: I will say a word. You will say the word back to me. I will tell you the sound to change, and you will tell me the new word.

Example: T: pay S: pay T: Change /p/ to /m/ and the word is? Student Response: may

Guidelines for Scoring the 1st Grade Phonemic Awareness Assessment Form A

This assessment provides information about a students' understanding of phonemic awareness at the phoneme (sound) level. If students struggle with this assessment, we offer progress monitoring assessments for specific skills to identify specific areas of need for students.

While the assessment results may inform instruction for intervention, many students begin school with limited exposure to these phonemic awareness skills, and most will make adequate progress through consistent whole group implementation of the daily Phonemic Awareness lessons.
